I am writing to you to strongly oppose all aspects of the proposed aerial tram in Griffith Park.

Griffith Park is one of the largest urban parks in North America, and arguably one of the wildest.

While some development exists around the outskirts of the park, the center is relatively untouched, and remains a haven for both hikers and wildlife alike, including the famous mountain lion P-22.

An aerial tram cutting across two miles through the middle of the park, with a viewing platform on Mount Lee near the Hollywood Sign would permanently scar this unique, urban wilderness. Wildlife patterns would be altered and native habitat destroyed forever.

The construction of such a colossal structure would mean long term closures of many hiking trails and areas within the Park and will be a disruption for the Angelenos who use the park daily.

In 1896, Colonel Griffith donated the Park to all citizens of Los Angeles as "a place of recreation and rest for the masses." An amusement park ride speeding above the heads of hikers and equestrians would certainly dishonor Griffith's noble intentions. Furthermore, by creating a ticketed-only attraction, this aerial tram would create an injustice to this space intended for use by all Angelenos, not just those who can afford it. In January, 2009, Griffith Park was designated Historic-Cultural Monument #942, creating the "largest urban wilderness park in the United States." The designation stipulated that "large portions of this landscape appear to retain integrity dating back to the period of the Gabrielino Indians."

Will you allow an aerial tram to defile this hard-won monument status?

The [Vision for Griffith Park](#) signed by Mayor Garcetti in 2014, clearly calls for preservation of wildlife, wildlife corridors, native species and park biodiversity. And on page 70, it unequivocally states, "At this time, there is no clearly identified need for new recreational rides, such as railroads, aerial tramways or funiculars." That seems crystal clear.

It is for these reasons that I oppose an aerial tram in Griffith Park and urge you to stop its development now.

And the number of vehicles used as dwellings in the parking lot has increased in just the last few days.

These matters are of great concern to our community because we were told by Hannah Levien of Mr. Bonin's office in November, during the Encampments to Home program, that vehicles used as dwellings could not be removed but that trash and other items around vehicles could be removed. At that time, Mr. Bonin's office scheduled a cleanup of the parking lot. Now the parking lot looks worse than it did back in November, and trash surrounds several vehicles in the parking lot. In addition, we were told back in November that vehicles used as dwellings could not be moved from the park, but campers could. Now we have people sleeping on the asphalt of the parking lot and using their vehicles as storage space. (See photos below.)

We were also told by Ms. Levien in November that the reason the vehicles could not be towed was because of a moratorium. That moratorium has now been lifted. (CF 21-0956.)

We request the following:

- That Mr. Bonin's office notice and conduct a cleanup of the parking lot that serves the Senior Center on at least a weekly basis.

- Mr. Bonin's office authorize LADOT immediately to begin enforcement and tow vehicles in the parking lots of the park that meet one of the five criteria specified in the LADOT report of February 23, 2022, which was adopted by the City Council. (https://clkrep.lacity.org/online/docs/2021/21-0956_rpt_DOT_02-23-22.pdf) Those criteria, as set forth in this report, include:

1. Vehicles that present a traffic safety hazard. Traffic safety hazard violations include blocked traffic lanes, walkways, fire hydrants, driveways, anti-gridlock/peak hour zones, and stolen vehicles. These vehicles commonly fall within the Community Caretaking Exception as defined in California Vehicle Code (CVC) Section 22650, and shall be removed immediately.

2. Vehicles that pose an environmental or public health hazard. Vehicles that create an environmental or public health hazard through the repeated excess accumulation of trash, debris or discharge of biohazard waste as documented by three (3) or more service call responses from the Department of Sanitation to mitigate this hazard may be towed. Similarly, vehicles that have been extensively destroyed, burned, or present a threat to environmentally sensitive habitats may be towed. LADOT will provide sufficient notice of pending enforcement action in those instances when the vehicle's owner is present, and LADOT will initiate and document engagement with homeless services providers prior to removal.

3. Vehicles that interfere with public works projects or special events. LADOT posts Temporary No Parking Tow Away signs to alert motorists of future construction activity, street resurfacing projects, or major public events such as parades, street fairs, marathon, etc., in which vehicles interfere with the ability to complete or safely conduct this activity. LADOT will cite and impound vehicles that remain on the street in violation of posted temporary signs.

4. Inoperable vehicles. Vehicles that cannot be safely or reasonably operated, such as vehicles that are clearly disabled, missing engine, windshield, tires, or other components critical to operating a vehicle will be removed after an officer provides sufficient notice to the owner/occupant.

5. Unregistered vehicles. Vehicles that are not registered may not lawfully operate on City streets and may be subject to tow following sufficient notice to the owner/occupant.

Many vehicles in the parking lot that serves the Senior Center meet one or more of the above criteria. We ask that enforcement begin immediately.

- As for vehicles that do not meet one of the above criteria, we request that outreach begin immediately so enforcement may follow.

Mr. Bonin, we believe you have the staff and authority to find parking lots in the City that do not include parks where people living in vehicles may park. A park is not an appropriate place for this use.

We formally request a meeting with you or your staff, Mr. Bonin, if there is any reason you believe you cannot do what we have asked.

To Whom It May Concern:

I recently submitted paperwork for a Permit to resume our use of a City Basketball Gym after stopping during Covid. Prior to Covid, we had been playing basketball on Sundays for 20 years plus. We are a group of regular citizens who pitch in and pay the City fee for use of the gym. We are not a league or a Professional organization of any sort. We just prefer to play indoors versus using the outdoor courts because we are older in age and can't compete with the young kids who play in the outdoor courts.

However, despite the permit being approved, I was contacted that we need insurance for the following reasons:

"...the City cannot take on liability caused by independent actions by the permittee including any equipment brought onsite by the permittee, actions by the permittee including instructions and/or methods how the basketball court is used, or the actions of any subcontractors (as applicable). This is the reason for the insurance requirement."

I am perplexed as to the insurance requirement. We are just regular citizens using a City basketball gym for basketball purposes. We don't bring in outside equipment to play nor do we use the gym for any other purpose other than to play basketball. We use the floor, backboard, rim, and net that the gym already has so no outside equipment is required.

Lastly, there are no subcontractors. It's just regular citizens of the City of LA paying to use the gym and we all pitch in for the fee that the City charges for use of the gym and for having an employee present. I'm just the person who filled out the paperwork to simplify the process and to provide one person as the main point of contact as we have been doing for the last 20 years or so.

Question: Are parents required to provide insurance before letting children play on the City jungle gym at the park? Children run, jump, crawl, climb, rough play, etc...It seems that in general, the City takes on that general liability by merely building things at a park for citizens to use and usually governmental entities are self insured for said purposes. I know this because I am a retired government worker and have worked for both a City government and the State of CA.

Additionally, is insurance required by those using the outdoor courts where the surface is harder and exposed to the elements? I'm pretty sure no insurance is required and thus, playing indoors is much safer.

Usually insurance is required by a private organization who acts/runs more like a business and charges money to be part of a league or that organization and then they use the facility for that purpose. In our case, we are just regular citizens who pitch in so we can use the indoor basketball court versus the outdoor court because of our age.

As previously mentioned, we are not a league or a professional organization. We are just regular citizens who pitch in to use the gym. Why did the City build a basketball gym if it wasn't meant to be used by regular citizens?

I strongly believe that we don't fall under an insurance requirement because we do not bring any outside equipment, we use the basketball court for only basketball purposes-nothing else, and there are no subcontractors, which are your reasons given to me by a City employee for insurance requirements. As stated above, we don't fall under any of the aforementioned categories.

Please consider all of the above and I hope that after your review, you will concur that any additional insurance is not required to use a City Basketball gym by regular citizens.

I was not able to speak at today's meeting due to technical difficulties, so the statement I intended to make is below.

Please forward to all commissioners:

Hello. I'm Marcy Valley. I am the Rancho Park Golf Course Representative on LA's Golf Advisory Committee.

I spoke to you 2 weeks ago about Rancho golfers' concerns about the lack of progress on remodeling the Rancho Clubhouse.

At the end of that board meeting, Commissioner Chase requested a status report on the Rancho remodel at the next Commissions Task Force meeting. That should have been this morning. It was cancelled.

In the last 2 weeks, we've learned that on April 27, the concessionaire submitted a 30-day notice of intent to withdraw from the contract; but that they are still negotiating. Does that mean that we are just waiting for May 27 for the axe to fall?

We've been told that the issues are asbestos and lead. The need to redo the electrical system from the street in has also been mentioned. I'm not a lawyer, but I have read MANY pages of the contract, and it seems clear to me that asbestos removal and the electrical system external to the clubhouse are the responsibility of the city. The concessionaire signed a contract to remodel the clubhouse, not to restore it.

I would like to remind the board and members of the public, that the Golf Division makes a profit, and they give about 80% of it to RAP to use on other projects. It has been more than \$8 million per year. Rancho Park is the most profitable of the city courses. This does not include the money the concessionaires pay for the right to run the concessions.

It is time for the city to act in its best interest to protect its income from the Golf Division and concessionaires, and step up to their responsibilities in the preservation and remodel of the Rancho clubhouse, which is a historically significant building.

I urge the RAP board to do everything in its power to bring these negotiations to a successful conclusion so that progress on the remodel can resume within a few weeks.

By the way, the GAC supports the Golf Division's revised Tournament Policy.

Dear Honorable Commissioners,

I am Lisa Gaines, a resident of Westchester and mother of three. I tried to call in but for some reason was not called upon.

Westchester Park now has 25 fenced off spaces for a Safe Parking program that is underused. It is the only Safe Parking program in a City Park in the entire city. The CAO determined a Safe Parking program is not feasible in Westchester Park because the park is heavily used and the parking is needed by park users: children, teens, seniors and families.

We ask that RAP deny any request for a permit to continue or expand the Safe Parking program in the park.

We also have approximately 20 vehicle dwellers in the park, some which are surrounded by their trash, many bulky, large other items and take up several parking spaces each. To be clear, they park wherever they please, blocking needed handicapped spaces. This prevents seniors and handicapped children from accessing the Senior Center and the Library. Many vehicle dwellers are aggressive. Let's be clear: there are campers living around the Senior Center.

This presents safety issues for park users, and many people are afraid to use the public park. The park should be a safe place for the entire community, and not for just a few.

Therefore, we also ask that RAP begin enforcement in the parking lots of the park now that the moratorium imposed by the City Council has been lifted.

We further ask that RAP, in conjunction with LAPD, step up enforcement to prohibit camping around the Senior Center, Library and in other areas of the park.

Dear Commissioners:

I strongly urge the Board of Recreation and Park Commissioners to officially designate bandshell portion of the performing arts pavilion at the Warner Ranch Park in Woodland Hills as the "Nora Ross Bandshell" in honor of a visionary long-term leader of the Valley Cultural Foundation.

Ms. Ross joined the Valley Cultural Foundation (VCF) in 2013, ultimately taking on the role of CEO. The VCF has provided free Sunday concerts in Warner Ranch Park since 1975. During her time at VCF, Nora not only continued those concerts, which provide an important community gathering place, but expanded VCF's reach in the park and beyond, across the entire San Fernando Valley. Many of her efforts focused on providing opportunities for local and emerging musical talent from the Valley.

Nora expanded the VCF's programming in Warner Ranch Park beyond the traditional Sunday evening concerts. At the Sunday concerts, she set aside time for local artists to perform before the headliners. VCF now hosts movie nights for families every Saturday night during the summer. Nora created "Rock the Valley" Battle of the Bands, to showcase emerging artists; in the fall, she brought artists and supporters together for a reception in the bandshell; and in the winter, she created a winter festival for families to enjoy the snow and other festivities.

Above all that, Nora went out of her way to help other community organizations by serving as a host for them to use Warner Ranch Park, the Lou Bredlow Pavilion, and VCF's resources for events to support their causes.

Under Nora's leadership, the VCF expanded beyond the park, establishing programs including Pop-up Park Art, which brings concerts to other parks throughout the San Fernando Valley; Bands, creating Emerging Artist Albums; holding a Music on the Move 5K Run to support VCF's Children's Programs; providing School Art program grants; and starting a Podcast series known as Arts on the Move. In 2017, VCF began presenting NoHo Summer Nights at the North Hollywood Recreation Center.

During the COVID pandemic, Nora stewarded VCF through financial straits while still finding a way to bring music and the arts to the community through virtual Concerts on the Couch, and hosting Drive-Up Movies.

Nora began serving the West San Fernando Valley community in 2006 when she became the Executive Director of the Canoga Park – West Hills Chamber of Commerce. While with the chamber, she led the effort to revitalize the small businesses in the community with the growth of a Memorial Day Parade, Dia de los Muertos, and St. Patrick's Day events.



In addition to her roles with the Valley Cultural Foundation and the Chamber of Commerce, Nora has been a caretaker, advisor, and advocate to and for many causes. She has sought out ways to bring organizations with similar missions together to create larger events. She has also continued to be a voice advocating on behalf of small businesses through the United Chambers of Commerce of the San Fernando Valley.

During her time at VCF, Nora not only continued those concerts, which provide an important community gathering place, but expanded VCF's reach in the park and beyond, across the entire San Fernando Valley. Many of her efforts focused on providing opportunities for local and emerging musical talent from the Valley.

On behalf of the residents of Highland Park's Arroyo Seco neighborhood, I write to address the deplorable conditions and danger at the Arroyo Seco Park (the "Park"). Since the opening of the Arroyo Seco Tiny Home Village, there has been an increase in drug distribution and sales, public drug consumption, and drug-related disorderly conduct at the Park which directly affects the surrounding neighborhood. Specifically, there has been a substantial increase of individuals purchasing and using drugs at the Park, a significant increase of unhoused persons illegally camping in the Park and the surrounding areas, and numerous illegally parked cars and RVs at and/or around the Park. This has made the Park unsafe and inaccessible to local residents. Additionally, due to unhoused individuals starting fires for warmth, cooking, and/or for other purposes, there is an increased fire danger to residents who live adjacent to the Park.

Unfortunately, The Hope of the Valley employees and/or volunteers who run the Arroyo Seco Tiny Village have not made any attempt to address or diminish the increased danger at the Park. There is no security in or around the Park, and the City of Los Angeles has not increased police patrol or intervention at the Park and the surrounding neighbors to curb the illegal activity and provide a sense of security to the neighborhood. Neighborhood residents have contacted Kevin De Leon and his office regarding these issues and they have not received adequate response or resolution.

We demand that you, the Commissioners, enforce the existing applicable ordinances and laws related to the Park, specifically as they relate to locking of the Park gate at night, impounding illegibly parked cars and RVs at and/or around the Park, and enforcing the ban on illegal camping in the Park.


